Continued unsafe use will result in a written warning from the committee

If a person continues to use a laser in an unsafe manner after a written warning, the committee has the right to ban that person from using a laser at the observatory.

Euan Mason put forth the motion to accept the Presidents Report, all members present voted in favour, motion carried.

Treasurers Report:

The accounts for CAS are in good strong shape. The society has been going from strength to strength as membership continues to grow and membership renewals are high.

With membership subs bringing in \$6,889.39

Public outreach open nights breaching capacity to what the lodge can hold, having a dedicated membership that continue to assist in coordinating and assisting at the CAS open nights is the back bone to the ongoing success and public popularity of these events.

Public open nights and kids fest manged a staggering \$17,612.51

With donations and grants also being a key to increasing the society's financial stability. CAS gratefully received a donation of \$1,900.00 that was granted to the society for the purposes of using for increasing the societies outreach capabilities. These funds have been invested a modern portable telescope mount for members old and new to learn the night sky, the mount can be used by accredited members to use their own instruments and portable enough to take off sight for public outreach events.

CAS has Steve Johnson to thank for this generous donation. Thank you very much Steve for thinking of CAS as a benefactor.

In addition to several grants to host out of town speakers and the RASNZ conference profits being allocated, CAS received \$2,459.72 in grants and donations. These funds were put to good use in increasing our presence at meetings in the purchase of flags and banners.

This year also saw the reintroduction of some CAS branded merchandise, stickers, cups and pens. This coming year is looking likely we will see a few additional initiatives along this vein. Keep an eye out. With total income for the society budgeted for \$25,000 – that figure was blown out of the park with a total of \$31,102.49.

The out goings for the society are creeping up, as with all organisations.

A few new initiatives to bring CAS out of the stone-age like having Wi-fi out at the observatory to run the all new Graeme Kershaw Sky Camera.

All office holders were well behaved with their expenditure and are always looking at ways to be the most efficient that they can be.

Observatory special projects included, finishing off the retaining wall from 2018, a few special wiring projects for the domes, a new i-optron mount with thanks form Steve Johnson, and the installation of the Graeme Kershaw Sky Camera.

With total expenditures budgeted to be \$19,558.12 meeting an actual expenditure of \$23,169.83 Higher than originally budgeted for but when we take into account the unexpected bequests that funded the majority of special projects our actual expenditure was less than predicted across the office holders and committee expenses. Each year CAS has its accounts independently audited, who has signed off the accounts with a big seal of approval.

And with that I wish to thank all the members of CAS for being part of this organisation, for being passionate about astronomy and giving your time and dedication to this society.

There were some questions from a member present re the replacement values for insurance purposes and David explained the reasoning to how much and why that amount was selected when the committee discussed the policy and updates

Euan Mason put forth the motion to accept the treasurer's report, all members present voted in favour, motion carried.

Observatory Director's Report:

Euan Mason read the Observatory report on behalf of Terry Richardson,

The Observatory precinct has gradually come into shape with some willing workers and work parties. The trees on the road boundary are mostly cleared now apart from some large logs which will eventually rot.

Trees for Canterbury supplied 87n plants for ground cover on the bank, and southern Woods tree nursery gave a discount for a row of Pittosporums along the fence line. The are now requires weeding to clear the space before winter, A work bee is planned for the next members night at the observatory. Scruffy plants have been removed from the fence-line by the steps and from in front of the upper terrace between the 14 inch and Nankivell domes. The bare retaining wall here has been oiled and stained.

Wiring was done and 230-volt power is now supplied to the Nankivell dome and the fibreglass dome. These both have 12-volt power supplies for the telescopes and lighting. As part of this job, we now have outside socket mounted on the wall of the 14 inch and by the fibreglass dome. These will be useful for computers, hair dyers etc on the terraces.

The fiberglass dome has been completely set up, A concrete pier was made, and the telescope mounted. This C11 has been polar aligned, Star aligned and training done.

On the social side we have had well attended members nights and working bees. I understand that in my absence, the summer BBQ went down well. I certainly know the Winter Bonfire was well attended and enjoyed.

Also on the social theme, I have installed paper towel dispensers and waste baskets in each of the toilets.

I wish to acknowledge support from committee and members in achieving these goals. I especially want to thank those who did mowing and gardening (and I guess other hidden chores) during my seven-week absence overseas over Christmas and New year.

Jobs for the future

The pressing job is now to replace rotting spars in the 14 inch dome. I was away for half the summer, and then had difficulty contacting the people we needed to asses this job. Sean Mullis, James Moffatt and myself have assessed the problem and come up with a plan. It is not a small job.

A whole panel will have to be removed, timber spars fabricated and replaced, the whole reassembled and them fiberglassed for waterproofness. This will take a concerted effort by a small team over 3 or 4 weekends. Now that we finally have this assessment, there is not enough time before open nights start, (if they do at all). We think it best to not do this in a rush, and plan for early next summer. The committee had decided to go ahead and get quotes to replace the 12 inch with a Celestron fork mounted CPC11. Quotes were obtained before December but Christmas intervened and the paperwork was not done. This process will be repeated in the near future with new quotes.

Dale Kershaw put forth the motion to accept the Observatory Directors' report, it was seconded by Simon Lewis, all members present voted in favour, motion carried.

I thank our members who sent items to be included and look forward to these arriving via email and I really do encourage all members to continue to do this in the future.

As part of the Editors job I also receive other New Zealand and several Australian society's including RASNZ, newsletter's and try to include items of interest in our own casmag

I want to thank Carol McAlavey for her continued support and as required assistance with getting the printed copies out in the post.

The Cas Coffee Mugs and pens with our new logo was another job completed,
